God's Word clearly describes this connection in **Colossians 1:16-17**; *For by him all things were created: things in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or powers or rulers or authorities; all things were created by Him and for Him. He is before all things, and in him all things hold together.*

God created all things. And even after the Fall, which did affect and infect all things, creation remains good. Christ's redemption impacts all things,

Bonnie is a passionate Believer, administrator and educator with significant experience in leadership, instruction, and special education. Bonnie joins us from the Durham District School Board (DDSB) where she has nearly 30 years of experience. Through her time with DDSB, Bonnie has held various roles including teacher, vice principal and, for the past 12 years, principal. JUNIOR KINDERGARTEN



GRADE1






The Grade 1's had a fantastic trip at the Kortright Center. They walked through the woods and learned about forest animals and plants that grow in the ground. In the afternoon they touched different animal furs and learned about insects. What a fun, wet day!







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GRADE 2/3





The grade 2/3 class experimented with the growth of plants by planting some seed in regular garden soil, and some mixed with our fertilizer that we helped make with the composting worms in our classroom. The seeds in the fertilizer, sprouted first and grew much higher than the ones growing with out the fertilizer. God is so incredible, creating worms that can eat organic scraps and turn them into nutrient rich fertilizer.







Grade 2 learned about growth and change in animals this spring. Each student completed a research project on the animal of their choice and produced a beautiful work of art to accompany their project. Our class trip to the Kortright Centre allowed students to play animal games, learn about animal life cycles, and investigate animal furs, bones, taxidermy mounts, and insects to learn more about them and how uniquely God created each one.











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GRADE 3/4



This year our class enjoyed a variety of events. The first, being participants in Orange Shirt Day, remembering the injustices the indigenous people endured. At Thanksgiving, they organized the school food drive to help those in need in our community. For the Christmas season the students took tags from our giving tree to work with their families to help others who needed encouragement or items to make their season a bit brighter.



We also were able to get a rock expert come in to help us learn about metamorphic, igneous and sedimentary rocks based on our rocks an minerals science unit.



Our Grade 4 students were able to experience an exciting day at Legoland as part of our field trip. We joined the science and language workshop where we were able to learn about pulleys and gears while making a story set using Lego. Students enjoyed taking part in different rides, activities and also 4-D movies.
